## TELL CITY HIGH SCHOOL

The ROAD OF LIFE means something different to each and every one of us, just as no two out of hundreds of people viewing a sunset, will ever see the same thing. What one sees or hears or thinks is determined by his or her heredity, environment, and mood.

The ROAD OF LIFE, very early in our own lives, leads into, across and coincides with, THE ROAD OF LEARNING, which enables us to take our stand as educated, literate, thinking, useful adults, and to carry our share of civic and family responsibilities. Our parents have told us (many times, we fear) that Life is much like a dime bank -- we get out exactly, and only, what we put into it, certainly, no more. Finally, after having followed the ROAD OF LEARNING for twelve years (short and wonderful ones, they were) we are just beginning to comprehend what they meant.

## A SHORT HISTORY OF TELL CITY HIGH SCHOOL

There are 211 graduates this year, which makes a grand total of 3,307 graduates from T.C.H.S.

The first class to graduate was the class of 1905 , with 3 members. At that time, our high school hed two teachers----Mr. Chris Newman, superintendent of schools, and Mr. Hardin Whitmarsh, principal of the high school.

In the early days, there were few subjects offered, and no choice was given students in courses. All freshmen took geography, government, algebra, grammar, and Latin. All Sophomores took adgebra, Latin, 1iterature and physics. All juniors took geometry, Latin, literature, and physios, and all seniors took geometry, Latin, iiterature, and botany.

A newspaper clipping from 1906 lists 37 students in the entire four years of high school. Also, at that time, grades earned by each student in each subject were printed in the Tell City News.

This year (1965) marks the 60th year for T.C.H.S. For the first few years, the high .school was housed in the 01d North Building, which stood where Newman Building does now. From 1909 to 1928, the present Franklin Building was the high scho-1's home. The new building on Twelf th Street was occupied in 1928, with additions in 1951 and 1963.

Our city has had eight superintendents: Chris Newman (1898 to 1923), Charles Hanner (1923 to 1929), J.S. Turner (1929 to 1934), G1en Traw (1934 to 1939), Napoleon Dixon (1939 to 1949), Fred Fechtman (1949 to 1955), G1en Bretz (1255 to 1953), and Grady Swad1ey (1958)

Mr. Hugh Thrasher has been serving as principal since 1956.

When the Class of ' 65 entered the halls of Tell City High School four short years ago, they were fearful as to what they would do here. They looked at the ' 62 gradvating class and wondered if thev could ever be grown up, sophisticated and educated like them.

But soon, those green freshies caught on to the routine and got into the swing of thincs. They soon made manv new friends, some of these friends would retain for the rest of their lives, and others they would never see after graduation.

The freshmen elected their officers and sponsors soon after they entered school. Thev were, Larry Reynolds, president: Dave Snith, vice-president; Mona Young, secretary and treasurer. Donna Ransey, Larry Kleaving, Jim Bob Aldridce, Rebecca Goffinet, Charlene Nebb, and Pat Newton were elected to the student council. As sponsors they chose Mr. Walk and Nr. Wyman.

Entering these halls for the second time as sophomores, they elected Lynn Blinzincer as Tresident; Larry Revnolds, vice-nresident; and Rickv llobbs as secretary and treasurer. Nr. Curry and Nr. Taylor were their sponsors. Those elected to the student council were Gary Briggenan, Barbara Hilgers, Glenn Phelps, Thor Connally, Ann Werner, Joel klenck, Joe Gengelbach and Dave Smith. During their sonhomore year, they ordered and received their class jackets. Later in the vear, they placed the order for their class rings at Wright's Jewelry.

September came, and they started their third year in high school. The first formal business was electing officers, sponsors and student council representatives. Larry Reynolds was elected president: Joe Gengelbach, vice-president; and Jackie Howland, secretary and treasurer. Their sponsors were Mr. Hardin and Nr. Richardson. The Student Council members were Bob Day, Alfred Snyder, Joe Gencelbach, Glenn Fhelps, Bernard LeClere, Lynn Blinzinger, Donna Young and Jin Hawlins.

It wasn't long before the juniors started working on the wonderful Junior Carnival. There were many shows to see and gares to play. Later, the dance was held. Nag Cunninghar and Narty Hinders reigned as king and Queen.

In the snrinc, it was time to start work on the Junior-Senior Pron. The theme for the prom was EVENING IN PARIS.

In the fall of 1964 , they entered these halls for the last time. During the last vear at TCHS, they would nake nany decisions, nany of which would shape their whole future.

The first task was to select class officers, sponsors, and student council renresentatives. The officers were Joe Gengelbach, president; Thor Connally, vice-president; and Erilv Fenn, secretary and treasurer. Sponsors were Mr. Hardin and Mr. Lowe. Student council menbers were Anna Kessans, Rebecca Drury, Nike Gillick, James Schroeder, Judy White, Dennis Ball, Dan Oberhausen, and Kenny Naxey.

The highlight of the senior year was graduation. They also had a magazine campaign. Their goal was $\$ 6,000$, which they exceeded-for the first time in history!

During their four years at TCHS there were forty-seven withdrawals and thirtythree new students.
