We're Proud of Our Team

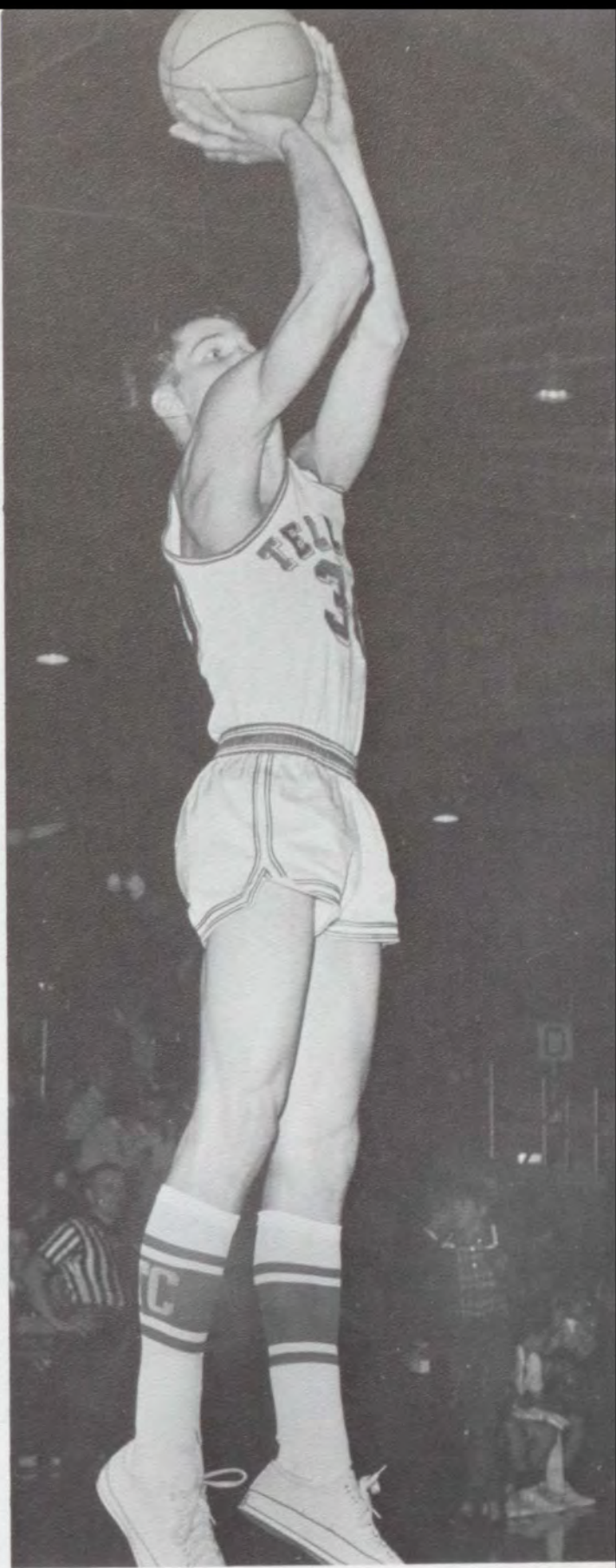
The 1967-68 basketball season for Tell City proved to be highly successful. Our Marksmen compiled a fine 16-8 record.

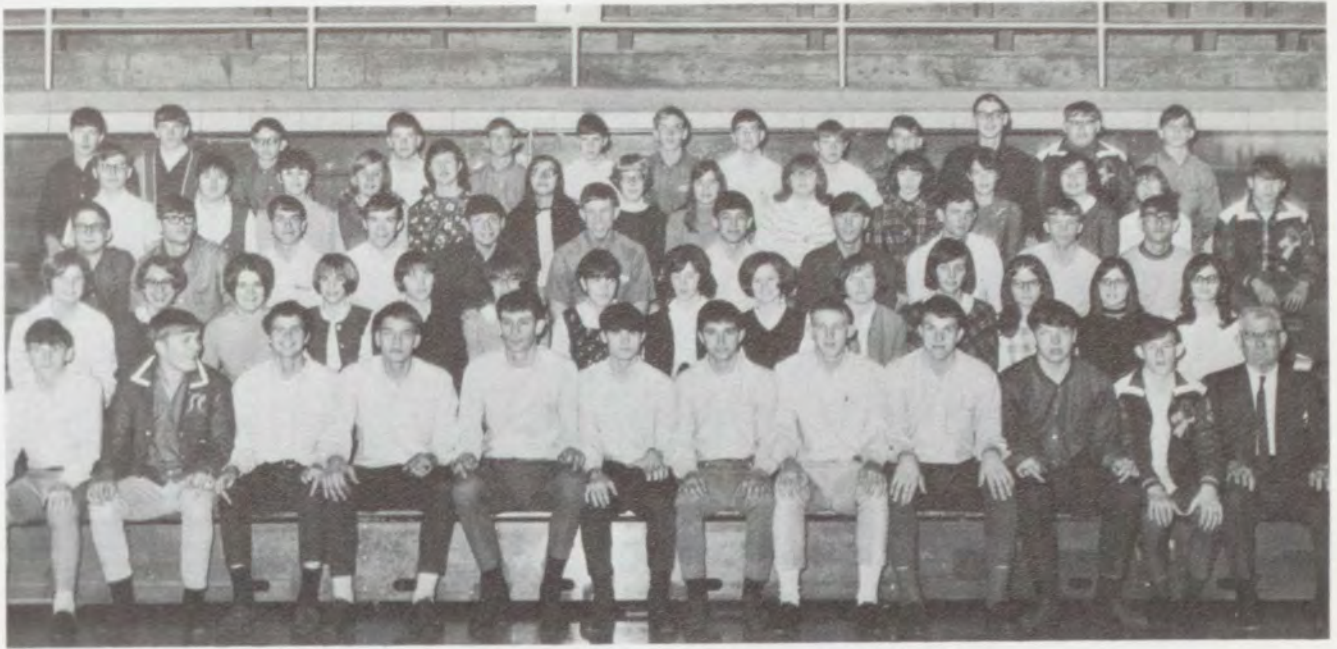


Bowling Club and Convocation
