
















Rev. Lee A. Brown gave the invocation and the benediction on the occasion.



He plans to attend Western Kentucky University and study Commercial Art. He feels that the lack of responsibility is the major problem in the world.


Chris Goffinet interests lie in politics, water skiing and wrestling. He was active in the French club, National Honor Society, Lettermen's Club, and Pep club.

The Creative Ones














The World of Technology






Many students took a new interest in the government as a result of the Presidential election held last year.







This year, Tell City High School added another winter sport to the schedule. Swimming was added because of the indoor pool which was designed in the new building.



Seven of the nine members will be returning for a second season next year. Coach Page is hoping for a better season since the team improved greatly from the beginning of the year right down to the end.






The 1980-1981 golf team at Tell City High School ended their season with a 26-21 record.





































Freshmen








THE CLASS OF 1984
