## Shop Classes

Woods is a popular class among our many students. Tables, dressers, cabinets, and cedar chests are just some of the many projects made in the woods classes. Students have the option to sell or keep their work. The many skills they learn will help to better prepare them for a job in the wood working industry.

Power Mechanics is a one semester course in the study of mechanical, electrical, and hydraulic uses. They are taught the basics in the building and repairing of small motors and engines. During shop they rebuild and repair recreational vehicles such as outboard motors, three wheelers, and push and riding lawn mowers.

Graphic Arts is used mainly as a print shop. Other skills are also taught such as book making, silk screen, basic film processing, opaquing, and plate developing which is used in the printing process. The class prints many items for the schools use.

Metals class is learning the basic uses of machines and tools in the shop. Working with everything from lathes to acetelyne torches, the students learn safety and proper use of these tools. Projects such as barbeque grills and rebuilding trailers are all done in the metals work shop.

The defense allowed only 73 first downs and registered 9 shutouts while the offense rolled for 193 first downs and scored 52 T.D.'s. The Marksmen were recognized in U.S.A. TODAY for their string of 6 shutouts and 26 consecutive quarters during which opponents failed to score.

King rushed for 930 yards and 18 T.D.'s; George followed with 752 yards and 12 T.D.'s. C. Zuelly had 17 catches for 294 yards and Buckman had 11 catches for 203 yards. Linemen Biever, Coleman, Jones, Cronin, Winchell, and Ward combined quickness and strength to provide running room and time to throw. Leading tackler Hubert was followed closely by Seibert, Labhart, and George.

BIG 8 All Conference selections were Jackson, T. Kincaid, King, C. Zuelly, Coleman, Cronin, Hubert, and George. Team awards include Coleman and Cronin - outstanding offensive lineman, King and T. Kincaid - outstanding offensive players, Hubert - outstanding defensive player, T. Kincaid - MVP, C. Zuelly - decal award, and T. Kincaid and C. Zuelly were selected as Co-Captains.
Outstanding effort by the offense, defense, and special teams made the 1988 football Marksmen a team to remember.
