Every year since the state band finals have been held in the Hoosier Dome, the Tell City Marching Marksmen
have been in them. As a fan reads his program he can trace the history of how previous Tell City bands have done. This year's group finished sixth in the state of Indiana. Many of the band members were sad that we didn't place any higher, but they kept the tradition of achievement alive at Tell City.
The members of the Marksmen football team proved to the state of Indiana once again that they were a force to be reckoned with. Throughout the season they were ranked number three in the state. For the second straight year Tell City's football team finished the regular
season with a perfect record. In the ten years since the Big 8 Conference was formed Tell City has won the conference title four times. In the past we have proven we were strong in football and the tradition continues.

Students at Tell City have long been encouraged to strive for academic excellence. Many upper level courses are offered for students to take. Also students can compete in the Hoosier Spell Bowl, the Academic Bowl and the Academic Decathalon. In 1989 the spelling team won the district competition, but lacked the score to advance to the state finals.
