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

"A State of Change" And Hope For The Future

In the eternal words of William Shakespeare, "Holy Saint Francis, what a change is here." The Tell City-Troy Township School Corporation has been through numerous changes during the 1992-93 school year. Some of these changes seemed to threaten the very cornerstone of our local educational system. On Thursday. August 27, 1992 Superintendent. Murray Pride announced his resignation; one day later, TCHS Principal, Mike Overmyer announced his resignation, leaving two administrative holes in the system. Both resignations were effective September 30, 1992. Citizens for Better Education rose out of this catastrophic week. However, as the dawn always comes, the end of November and

early December brought Mr. Marion Chapman as Superintendent and Mr. Dan Freed as Principal.

The Classroom Teacher's Association has also had numerable meetings with the school board over the 1991-92, 1992-93 and the 1993-94 contract negotiations this year. Teachers picketed in opposition to numerable board decisions. At press time none of these contracts were settled.

However, even during all of these administrative problems the teachers continued to perform their jobs excellently. This year also experienced the addition of four new teachers: Mrs. Brenda Black, Miss Jo Ann Deich, Miss Amanda Magner and Mr. Tracy Runyon. Even though things were changing, teachers and students continued their quest for education and excellence.


The TCHS Marksmen football and wrestling teams also had quests for excellence this year. Head Coach Mike Spencer and his varsity team had a twelve game consecutive winning streak which had never happened in the history of TCHS. The Marksmen won The Big Eight Conference, the Sectional and the Regional. However, the Westfield defeated Shamrocks Marksmen at home 7-0 in the Semi-State competition.

The Marksmen wrestlers won the first Big Eight Championship title in the history of Tell City High School in January. The English department joined many high schools across the nation this year when an IBM computer writing lab was added to the school. Twenty-eight IBM computers with 386 processors were purchased. The lab has allowed all of the English teachers to integrate computers and more writing into their individual curriculums. The school corporation trained the English teachers during four in-service days.

Many things have changed in the Tell City-Troy School Corporation and in the world. The year 1992-93 indeed has been a State of Change. However, all things considered, the changes will help lead us into a stronger and more productive future.





Sophomore Jon Klueh works on a writing assignment in Mrs. Buckman's English class.





Trip brings cultural awareness

The summer of 1992 brought excitement to three French students and their teacher. Mrs. Dowlut took Laura Mahaney. Tamara Schulze, and Karrie Goffinent on a five day tour of Canada. The students traveled to Montreal and Quebec City where they toured the Notre-Dame Basilica, which is the largest building in North America seating up to 7,000 people. They also visited the 83 meters high Montmorency Falls which is approximately 30 meters higher than Niagara Falls. They feasted one evening at The Festin du

Governeur. The Festin du Gouverneur is on an underground island and guests must take an underwater subway to get there. It is set in the 18th century and guests pretend that the governor invited them to eat with him. A man from Quebec dresses up in 18th century clothes and pretends to be the governor. The governor sits at the head of an 18th century wooden, long table with benches. Since forks did not exist in the 18th century, guests are not given any utensils other than a knife. In fact guests often find that their hands work just as well as their knives.

The food is served by waiters and waitresses in 18th century clothing and while guests eat, singers and actors put on a comedy.

When asked about the French trip Mrs. Dowlut replied," C'etait manifique!" (It was magnificent!) Karrie said, "I enjoyed the experience of the different culture and I loved the French food." 













Did you know? Auto Tech has changed over the years

In the last few years the modern car has become a complex machine. It is no longer like the old model "T." The average car has over 12,000 different parts. With all of these parts and cars on the road today, properly educated mechanics are in high demand. Auto Technology at Tell City High School introduces you to the major parts of a car.By learning about the main components, you are better prepared to work on cars. Many seemingly unrelated parts can affect each other. This makes it very hard to locate some problems. This is also the reason good mechanics are in high demand.

An automotive system is a group of related parts that perform a specific function. A car's steering wheel is part of the steering system. This system allows the driver to turn the front wheels. The brake pedal is one part in the braking system. This system allows the driver to slow or stop the car.

The frame of a car refers to a very strong, steel structure that supports the other components of the car. Some cars have frames separate from the body. Many new cars use the internal body structure as a frame. This is called unitized construction, space frame, or unibody. Some inner body sections are strengthened so that they can support the engine, suspension, and other major parts.

The suspension system lets the car's wheels move up and down with little or no body movement. This helps the car ride smoothly and safely. The suspension system must also prevent the car from leaning

excessively in turns. Various springs, bars, swivel joints, and arms make up the suspension system.

The steering system allows the driver to control vehicle direction by turning the front wheels right or left. It uses a series of gears, swivel joints, and rods.

The brake system produces friction to reduce speed or stop the car. When a driver presses the brake pedal, fluid pressure expands the brake mechanism on each wheel. The front apply the most pressure first. Then the farther the brake pedal is pushed down the pressure on the front and rear is evened out.

The engine provides the energy to move the car and to operate other systems. Most car engines run on gas or diesel fuel. The fuel burns in the engine to produce heat. The heat causes expansion and pressure. The pressure can then be used to move the parts of the engine and produce power. An engine is usually located in the front of the chassis. With the heavy engine in the front, the car is safer in a head-on collision. A few cars have the engine mounted in the rear.

The Auto Technology class is a class that teaches you about the basics principles in a car. The car of today is a very complex machine. The fuel system and electrical system take many hours of study to completely understand. Proper service and repair methods are critical to the safe, reliable operation of an automobile. The Auto Technology class will teach you these proper methods and enable you to repair a car properly









Student managed bank opens - The Marksmen Teller



then they can go to the Marksmen Teller and take out a loan. There were many new and exciting programs that were started up this


year, but the Marksmen Teller was exciting and very student orientated.









HOSA - A good place to begin in the health services feild

"What is HOSA?" That is a question that many people ask students who are enrolled in the class. Students tell others that is something worth while and that anyone interested in the health field should get into. "How do I get into HOSA?" a lot of people ask. Students tell them that it is really easy, just join the vocational class Health Occupations.

Health Occupations is a three hour vocational class in which people learn about all the opportunities in the health field. Students go from knowing very little about the health field to learning and being certified in first aid and CPR (coronary pulmonary resuscitation). Students also learn how to take TPRs (temperature, pulse, and respirations) and blood pressure readings. Students also work in the hospital.

"What does HOSA stand for?" Health Occupations Students of America. Tell City High School has two chapters. Each has their own officers but all events are done together. Some of the many events that were done include a Christmas float in the parade and a disaster drill.

The disaster drill is different each year. This year there was a chemical spill at the public pool. Students made bruises and blisters out of make up. The EMTs had to dress as if it were a real disaster. It is not a drill for HOSA but a drill for the EMTs and they do not know that it is a drill until they get there.

Students also went on a field trip to Davis County Hospital. They visited the respiratory therapy and maternity wards. They also went on a tour of Perry County Memorial Hospital.

HOSA also has State chapters. In the state election Lisa Goffinet was elected Vice President. She has monthly meetings which she attends in Indianapolis. She also gets to do a lot of public speaking. Lisa says that this is a good experience and will help her in college.

Health Occupations is a great class in which to get involved. Helping people and caring for them is something important and if you enjoy it, you should get into it to.

Home Economics -- 101

Intensive Office Lab prepares for placement

Preparing for that State of Change when they get into the real world are the 19 girls who are enrolled in the Intensive Office Lab course offered by Tell City High School.

Intensive Office Lab, or IOL. is a senior level course designed to prepare students for entry level positions in the business world and provide the basic foundation necessary for further education. This class is lead by Mrs. Cheryl Farmer who teaches each of her students the importance in knowing what to expect when they go into the real world. In each class the students use the basic office equipment and learn to use atime clock. They receive a check for each day they are present and in some cases they receive pay deductions. There are two classes. one in the morning and one in the afternoon, which each meet for two hours a day.

In each class students work in two types of stations: functional stations and work stations. Students working in functional stations are in a supervisory capacity, and are responsible for seeing that the lab operates efficiently. These jobs included

being an Office Manager, Assistant Office Manager. Supplies Clerk and Receptionist. The work stations may be based on actual businesses within the surrounding area or may be a purchased package. Hagedorn Law Office, Hollinden Real Estate and Citizen's National Bank are some of the area businesses. Students use word processing equipment to complete stations in the areas of insurance, real estate, accounting, banking, legal affairs and medical office. Each station is on a ten day rotation period, but each varies in the time it takes to complete depending on its length and the expertise of the student.

Each student enrolled in IOL is automatically in an organization called Business Professionals of America, or BPA. The classes elect five girls to serve as officers. They are: Jamie Quick, President; Shannon Clark, Vice President; Stephanie Hughes, Secretary; Carrie Taylor, Historian and Terri Alvey, Reporter. The officers receive mail correspondence from other officers around the state of Indiana. They have meetings to decide what, if any, fund raisers they would like to have, they

decide where they will hold the annual IOL party and how the money in their account is spent.

The top BPA students compete in District Competition each January. Students from 27 Southwestern Indiana high schools attend this competition. Those who qualify then go on to State Competition in Indianapolis in March. The Western Hotel serves as headquarters for the state competition with most events being held at the convention center, the hotel, or local high schools.

The class also helps the Kiwanis Club in their efforts to help the needy families of Perry County. They put letters to the public in envelopes and seal them so they are ready to mail before the holiday season. The letters are asking the people of Perry County to donate money or food to give to the needy.

This class gives its students a sense of responsibility. It also gives them a chance to be themselves and they develop skills which will help them in their future careers. Before long all these girls will understand the meaning of a State of Change!



During the year there is a physical fitness test for which students can qualify and win a Presidential Award or Fitness Award.









only 3.2 points a game.






















The cheerleaders performing for the entire student body before going to the National competition in Jacksonville, Florida.
