




day with a number of anxieties and concerns. The student council sought to alleviate some of those worries by hosting the second annual Freshmen With Questions freshmen orientation.


On August 5, students lined up at tables in the Bryan Taylor Sports Arena to receive their schedules and locker combinations.















leave families and friends, but at the same time they are excited about what the future


holds. This was evident at the graduation ceremony at Legion Field.

The most highly rewarded aspect of high school is not fancy clothes, social prestige, or fast cars--it is academics. Student performance in high school helps determine the postsecondary route each individal will take. Students were offered a wide variety of classes that ranged from auto-mechanics to art and physics to Web Page Design. In band and chorus, students took trips, attended competitions, and practiced constantly. Foods and Foreign Language classes, such as Spanish and French, were offered as electives. Many students chose the "hands-on" courses, which put them in classes like Building Trades and Industrial Technology. The classes students participated in varied between the diploma track each person took. The Standard Diploma was for students who met the minimun graduation requirements. These students needed to earn 41 credits in the same departments as the other diploma tracks, with fifteen of these credits coming from electives. The Core 40 Diploma was chosen by a great deal of students. It outlines the cirriculum for college- or university-bound students, with the student's choice of electives included. Some students met the requirements to earn an Academic Honors Diploma. In order to earn this diploma students had to earn a minimun of 47 credits, with six to eight of these credits coming from a foreign language. This diploma asked for the most rigorous schedule, and it was the only diploma that required a student to take a foreign language.

# Making Changes

Working Hard to Achieve

The Class of 2007 started out the year knowing that more credits were going to be required for graduation than in previous years. This year the credit requirements for a standard diploma jumped from forty-one to forty-seven. Students wanting to receive a standard diploma must earn thirty-four required credits and seventeen elective credits.

Required credits in math and science were increased from four to six. All students are required to take algebra. Students with no experience in algebra take Pre-Algebra. Second year algebra students take Algebra 1. Students must also recieve a credit in a biology class taught by Mr. Alvey or Mrs. Thomas. In those classes they experienced in-depth studies of plants, cells, and genetics. The four other credits may be obtained by taking Earth Science, Meterology, or Astronomy taught by Mr. Johnson.

One year of physical education and one semester of health and safety are required for all graduates. Students evolve basic skills through a variety of activities, learning

important information on the well-being of the mind and

Eight English credits are required. There are basic and advanced English classes for each grade.

It is also necessary to get six credits in social studies. Two may be earned by taking either World History or Geography. US History and Government are required. The final credit can be earned by taking Psychology, Sociology, Consumer Economics, or Marcoeconomics.

Two technology credits must also be earned by taking keyboarding or another computer class.

Elective credits can be earned by taking classes in subjects such as foreign language, art, and vocational classes, such as Auto Mechanics, Heating and Air, or Health Occupations.







# Core 40 Diploma

Preparing for the Future.

Are you prepared for life? If students are Core 40 scholars, they are prepared for just about anything. The Core 40 program prepares students to be successful in a variety of technical schools, colleges, universities, and even the military.

A student must earn at least forty credits throughout their four years of high school in order to graduate with a Core 40 diploma. To earn the forty credits needed, students must have eight credits in English, six to eight credits in mathematics, six credits in science, six credits in social studies, one credit in a physical education course, one credit from a health and safety class, and two to four credits must be earned through taking elective courses. Students earn one credit per semester for each class, with the exception of Physical Education, which is 1/2 credit for each semester.

Although Core credits are required, there are

many different varieties of classes one can take to earn the required amount of credits in each subjects' category. Many different levels are available for each subject. For example there is General, Advanced, and Honors English for each grade level, and there is Earth Science, Physical Science, and Biology. In the subject of math, there is Pre-Algebra, Algebra, and Business Math. This wide variety of classes helps students prepare themselves for life after high school.

Core 40 track classes are not always boring classes. For example, in biology class, students dissected frogs for a week during second semester. In Mrs. Aubrey's English 10 class, students were required to do several projects, including building a mock setting of some of the stories that were read.

# ACADEMIC HONORS

Going Above and Beyond

The number of seniors graduating with the Academic Honors Diploma this year was almost three times the number last year. Twenty seniors had enough credits, the right classes, and high enough grades. The number seems to be increasing over the years. Over forty freshmen signed up this year.

A minimum of 47 credits must be completed. To attain this diploma, students must get eight credits in English Language Arts, six credits in social studies, eight credits in mathematics, six credits in science, six to eight credits in foreign language (six credits in one language or two credits of each language), two credits in fine arts, one credit in heath and safety, and one credit in physical education.

There are several other requirements. Language arts credits must include English Literature, Composition, and Speech. World history and Marcoeconomics are also

required in social studies. Algebra II must be taken. Science credits must include two in Biology and two in Chemistry or Physics.

Students must have earned a grade of "C" or above for each course to count towards the academic honors diploma; however, students must have at least a "B" average overall.


Several upper level classes are available in most subjects. Students can take Trigonometry, Pre-Calculus, and AP Calculus. AP Chemistry, Biology II, and Anatomy and Physiology class are also able to be taken. Fine art classes include Band, Chorus, and a variety of art classes, including Basic Art, Calligraphy, and Ceramics.





Grasping useful skills

Who would have ever thought that some of the classes you would take in high school could potentially lead your future career? Who knew that after taking a health occupations class you could become a certified nurse's assistant? Or that you could learn a trade of your choice by taking a class that sounds fun to you. Auto mechanics, woods, metals, building trades, heating and air, cadet teaching, IOL health occupations, finance/banking and ICE are all classes that can give you insight on a possible career field.

In auto mechanics students learn the different parts of the cars and how they work. Once they have learned about all of that they get to work on actual cars.

Each year the students in building trades build a house to be purchased by someone in the community. The heating and air class works in cooperation with the

IOL students go out to businesses and work in their offices during the school day.


Health occupation students go to the hospital and nursing homes to gain experience in the field. It is possible for some of these kids to become certified nurse's assistants at the end of the course.

























# Yearbook Staff






At the beginning of the year, the yearbook staff had a big task ahead of them. Putting together a yearbook may not sound difficult; however, it turned out to be tons of work.
