







As the fairly tale goes, we all live happily ever after!











BORN TO BE WILD



















In her retirement Mrs. Hall is looking forward to enjoying uninterrupted days of serenity, meeting old friends to chatter and laugh with, and spending time with family.






Got Served Serve.









It was an exciting year. Winning 12 consecutive games and tying the school record for most wins were just two of the highlights that made for an enjoyable year.










The 2006-2007 season of Marksmen basketball was an exciting one. They were PSC Tourney champs, PAC Conference runners up, and sectional finalists.










The girls continued to win in the Lady Hornet Classic where they placed second out of seven teams.






Making the Band





MAGNIFYING OUR EXCELLENCE

There were a wide variety of courses available to the students of Tell City High School this year. There were "hands on" classes such as Auto Mechanics and Health Occupations, "electives" such as art and band, and "required" courses such as U.S. Government and Biology I.

Each class that students chose to take depended on which diploma they wished to recieve. The standard diploma was given to students who earned the minimum graduation requirement of 47 credits. 32% of the students in the senior class chose to try for the Core 40 diploma. This diploma maximizes opportunities for graduates and still allows them to participate in electives of their choice. The Academic Honors diploma is the most rigorous of all of the diplomas. When trying to earn this diploma, students are required to take a foreign language for three years, and acquire a minimum of 47 credits.

After four years of high school, when all of the hard work is complete, you can see the *Light* at the end of the tunnel, the *Cameras* as you walk across the stage to receive your diploma, and you gear up for the *Action* of the future to come.












PAY IT FORWARD
