Acting nerdy isn't difficult for sophomore Nick Bower. He made the job look too easy at the Academic Pep Rally where the theme was Nerd Invasion.





When questioned if he was interested in a career pertaining to math, junior Neal Goffinet answered, "I'm planning on pursuing a career in chemistry which is very math oriented."




























Getting What We Deserve
































ATTACK OF THE NERDS!




















The boys finished their season with a record of 7-6. The Marksmen will be saying goodbye to Bryson May, Isaac Schaefer, and Zach Avallone.















Sara Conner and Brittany Conner pose for a picture during the commencement ceremony as they wait patiently for their diplomas.





All three of them said they would like to take our school spirit back to Germany.


