


We, the Class of 1947, dedicate this second edition of The Trojan, our last official act as a class of Troy High School, to our dear parents.


Georgia Ann is graduating this year. We hope that Hazel and Juanita will continue the good work and teach the new cheer leader to continue the good work in the years to come.
