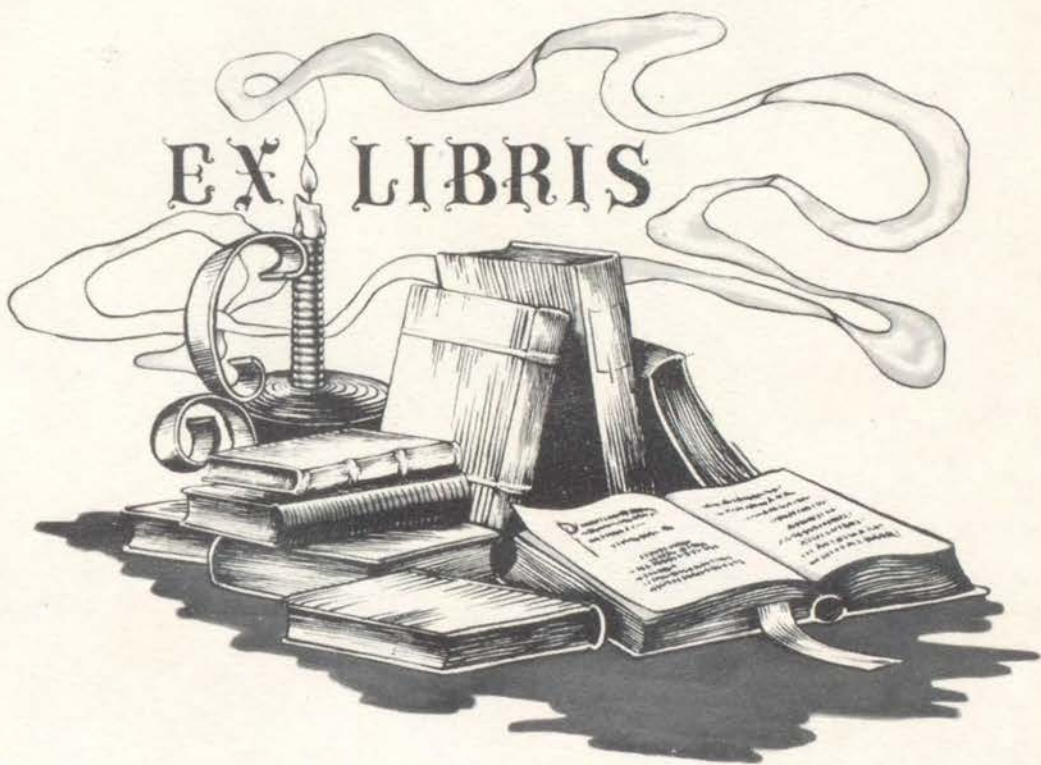

Mrs. Van Sandt has been married for thirteen years and has one daughter. Her hobby is reading.

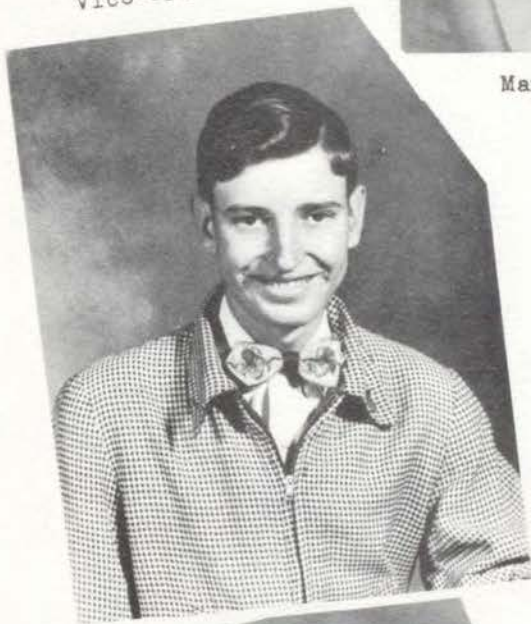

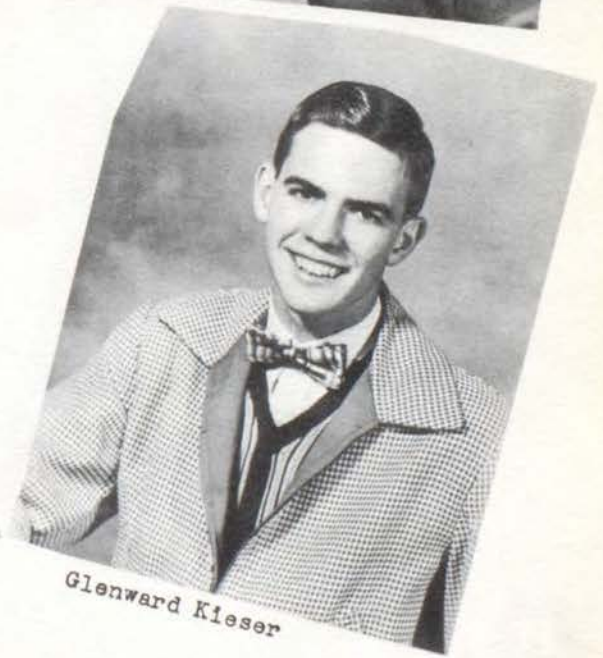

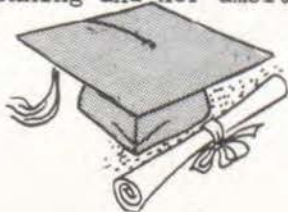
The song she likes best is "Because You're Mine". Her boyfriend is Marvin Powell and her ambition is marriage.

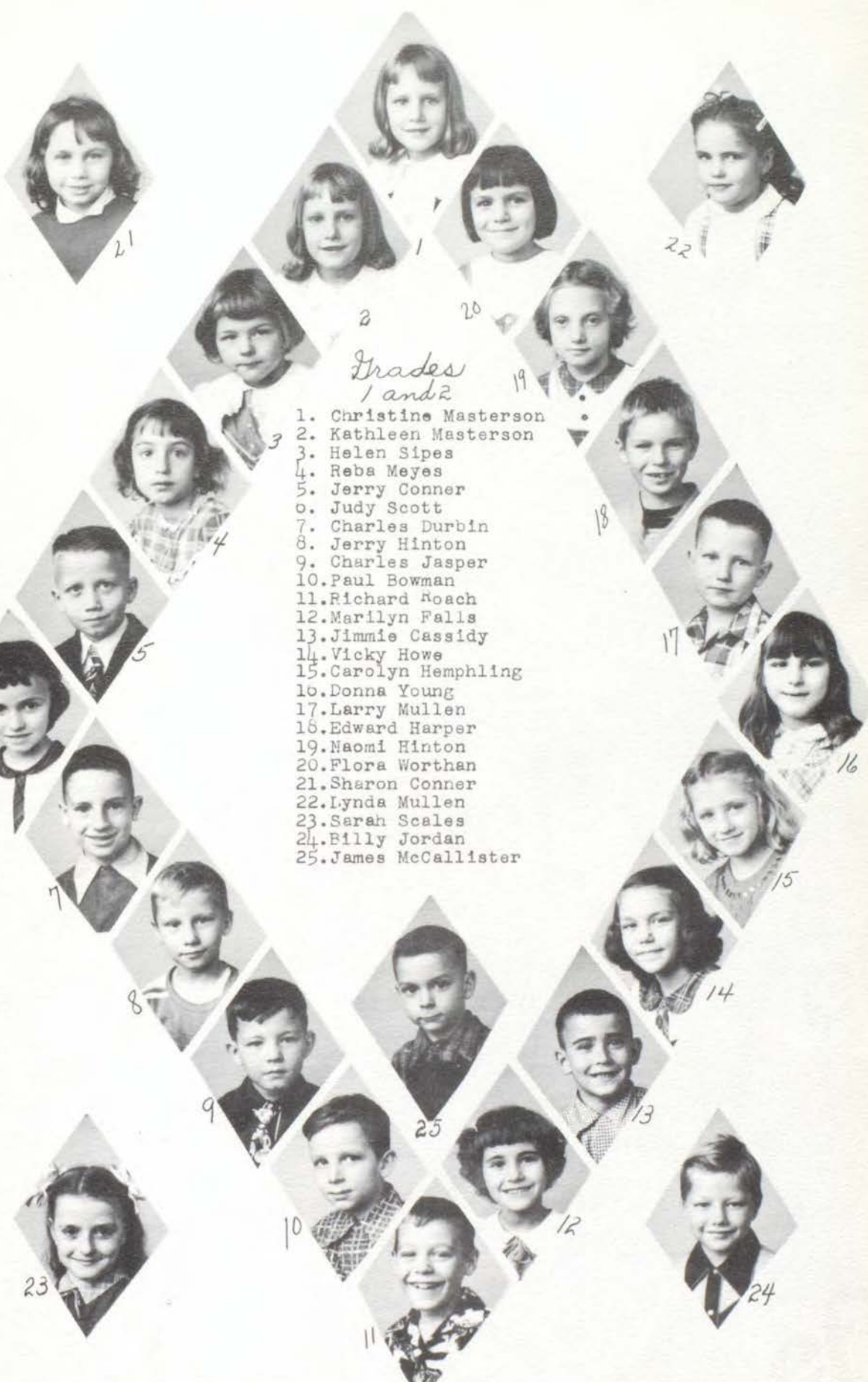

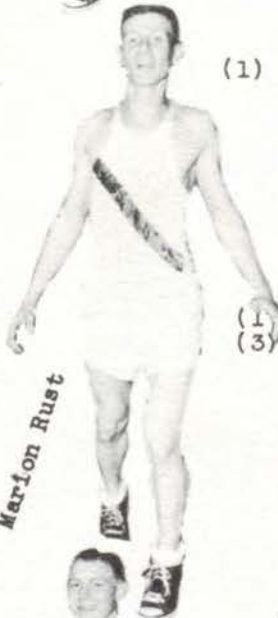

Out in front leading our cheers for the 1953-52 basketball season were our Troy High cheerleaders. We're very proud of our girls for the hard work they've done and the success they've made.

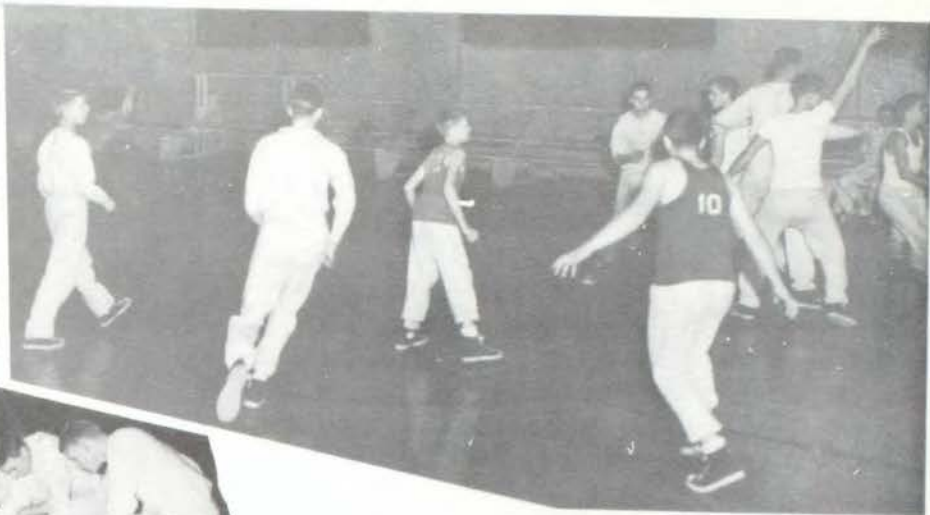

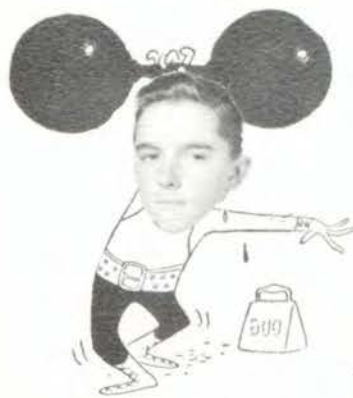

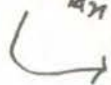
